Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.

We observe Lent because it tells us to STOP and rest awhile — and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to LOOK inward for an honest self -examination, to look upward to



see the cross of Jesus with healing and love, and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent because it tells us to LISTEN — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent.



### The Way Forward

December 2022

Bethany Church Council met Tuesday evening, January 17, 2023. During that meeting, a timeline was developed for moving forward in our disaffiliation with the United Methodist Church. We want everyone to be aware of the progress being made and the anticipated calendar of events.

There is much to learn regarding the way forward for our church. The two pathways include the Global Methodist Church or becoming an independent church. In helping each of us discern our best path, a presentation is scheduled for February 5, 2023 during the Sunday School hour. It will be held in the sanctuary at 10:00 am.

One week following, February 12, 2023, the congregation will vote on whether to become a part of the Global Methodist Church or to become independent. Though Council is preparing a comparison study for the congregation, each of us is encouraged to prayerfully research both directions to make the decision we feel is pleasing to God. This vote will be accomplished at the conclusion of each worship service.

In event of bad weather, our presentation and vote could possibly be delayed by one week. We are very interested in including everyone in the congregation in this decision making.

- Scissors


#### What you do:


